From: ARPA Steering Committee

The attached report outlines the committee's work process and recommendations relating to community applications for the American Rescue Plan (commonly referred to as ARPA) funds. As is noted in the report, a great many applications were received and thoroughly reviewed. All applications are available for viewing at https://tinyurl.com/TroyNow2022, along with an overview of Appropriations to date (Exhibit A), the fifteen community projects the committee recommends to the council (Exhibit B), and a spreadsheet of all applications received (Exhibit C).

This \$5.010 million investment in the fifteen projects throughout the city, along with past funding allocations, will bring the total investment to fund local projects and programs in the City of Troy to \$17.8 million.

In addition to the community applications the Committee discussed other priorities of the City, and recommends the following appropriations:

- Implementation of a trash barrel program throughout the city for those not currently receiving a city-issued barrel in the amount of \$1,000,000.
- EMS Surge Staffing in the amount of \$600,000.
- \$4,000,000 towards replacement of the Knickerbacker pool.
- \$1,000,000 for building demolitions within the City.
- \$2,500,000 for a Premium pay stipend for all employees eligible under federal guidelines. Pending:
 - Development of final program details,
 - A review by Corporation Counsel, and
 - o An agreement between the city and each bargaining unit.

The Committee recommends a one-time stipend for full time eligible employees of \$150.00 per month worked (max of 20 months) plus an additional \$100.00 per month for employees earning less than \$48,000 annually (excluding this premium pay stipend).

The Committee recommends the remaining funds be held in reserve to support other projects for which the City is pursuing State and Federal funding such as One Monument Square and to address potential future city budgetary pressures due to the economic climate.

ARPA Community Application Process

Background

Earlier this spring the Administration held a series of workshops across the City promoting the availability of ARPA funding for community initiated projects. Concurrently a website was designed which included an application. The funding availability was promoted heavily through community meetings and social media postings as well as through more traditional means.

Applications were due no later than May 6, 2022.

A total of 84 distinct applications were received requesting in excess of \$61 million.

General Observations on applications:

- Some proposals lacked critical details such as a budget or detailed plans or the applicant lacked
 the capacity to execute. We view these not so much as applications for funding but as ideas the
 city should contemplate. Many of these can be referred to the appropriate City department for
 further study in the context of other planning that is occurring.
- Some proposals were recommendations for spending on public projects, i.e., parks and other
 infrastructure. These too will be referred to the appropriate city department for consideration
 and prioritization.
- Some proposals involved subject matters that were funded in the first round of allocations and will be referred to those working groups, i.e., tourism or workforce development, etc.
- A small number of proposals are of interest, in whole or in part, to other sources of funding.
 The administration is working with those applicants and funders in an effort to reduce the
 demand on ARPA funds. (One example of this is the Little Italy application to improve the
 Market Place.)
- And some projects were already complete or well underway indicating that ARPA funds were not essential to their execution.

Considerations:

Each application was considered and discussed in meetings attended by the Council President, Majority Leader, Mayor, Deputy Mayor, and Comptroller. In deliberations the following factors were taken into consideration:

Has the Applicant the capacity to undertake the proposed project?

Will the proposed project be self-sustaining in future years?

Are the proposed costs realistic?

Will this investment have a long-term impact?

How well does the proposed project align with the allowable uses as defined in the Treasury auidance documents?

Are other funds leveraged to advance this project?

We were also guided by the Treasury Regulations that prioritized as follows:

The broadly stated purpose of the SLFRF (we refer to it as ARPA) is to provide local governments "with resources needed to respond to the pandemic and its economic effects and to build a stronger, more equitable economy during the recovery."

Eligible Use Categories Include:

Assistance to the Unemployed workers,

Affordable housing development,

Childcare,

Early learning services,

Investments in neighborhoods that promote improved health outcomes,

Addressing vacant or abandoned properties,

Assistance to small businesses,

Food assistance,

Housing insecurity,

Job training,

Aid to impacted industries including but not limited to: tourism, hospitality, travel,

Addressing Educational Disparities,

Promoting Healthy Childhood Environments.

Funding Recap and Recommendations:

The City received a total of \$42.8M from the SLFRF program.

To date the City Council has appropriated the sum of \$22.53M covering a range of initiatives (Exhibit A), leaving an unappropriated balance of \$20.26M.

The Steering committee recommends funding those proposals in the amounts scheduled in Exhibit B. The total amount recommended for funding community applications is \$5,010,800, leaving a balance of \$15,257,060, for Council/Administration directed appropriations.



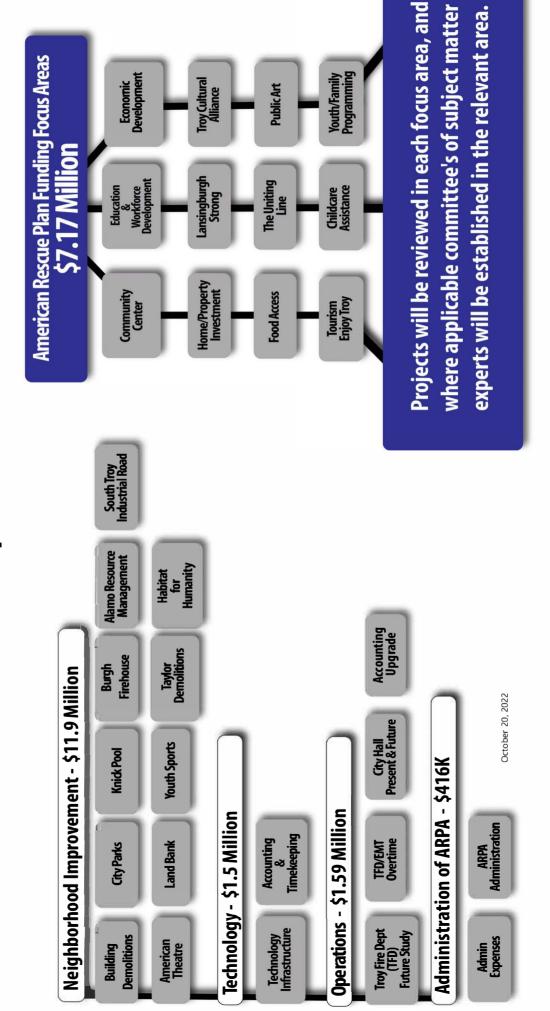
